

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to Vatican II: Proclaiming the Joy and Hope of Christ to the Modern World!

For nine sessions, we will rediscover the true teaching and vision of Vatican II - and rediscover the New Evangelization for our world today.

Vatican II provides a pastoral vision and renewal that is the foundation for the New Evangelization. The documents of Vatican II reveal a renewal of the mission of the Church to bring Christ to the modern world. The Council shows how every Catholic is called through their Baptism and Confirmation to continue the saving mission of Christ in the world today.

The Council took place from 1962-1965 – but the "event" of Vatican II lasted until the end of Benedict XVI's papacy, who was the last pope to be present at the Council itself. This means that the Church is still unpacking and implementing the Council. This also means that it's important for Catholics to understand what the Council really was. While there have been many "spirits" of the Council that claim authority apart from the actual teachings of the Council documents, it's important to understand the true teaching and vision of the Council.

If you look at any of the previous 20 ecumenical councils, it always takes at least 50-100 years for the dust to settle in the life of the Church after the council. Popes from St. John Paul II to Francis have insisted that there needs to be a rediscovery of the true spirit of the Council by the reading of the documents themselves, as interpreted and implemented in the life of the Church by the Magisterium.

Prayer of Vatican II

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. How does the Church reflect the Light of Christ? What makes the Church more effective in mission? Why is the Church a divine institution, and how is this reality revealed to the world?

2. How can we understand Vatican II as a new Pentecost and a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit? How do the gifts of the Holy Spirit help build up the Church and promote the work of evangelization? How can we be open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit?

3. What is the priestly mission of the laity? How is the baptismal priesthood different than the ordained priesthood? What is the relationship between the baptismal priesthood and the prophetic and kingly mission of the laity?

4. The universal call to holiness is a key theme of *Lumen Gentium*. What are the means to holiness? How do these means draw us closer to Christ? What is the relationship between personal holiness and the work of evangelization?

5. *Lumen Gentium* discusses Mary as the model for the Church and for all Christians. Why is her example the model we need to follow? How does she inspire you to become more closely conformed to Christ?
