Hanifen as a council to enhance our identity as Afro-American Catholics doing God's work, and to give one another strength, encouragement, and fellowship. As such, we have become involved in several activities which allow us to share in accomplishing our mission more actively and to experience the spiritual growth we continually seek.

In 2022 the council implemented its Junior Membership for individuals 13-17 years old.

We are blessed to be a recipient of a grant from the Black and Indian Mission Office to pursue our evangelization and outreach efforts.

The council is diocese-wide.


Mission Statement

NBCC Regional Conference


Two members attended the one-day conference held in Denver in February.

A. Philip Randolph
(1889-1979)
Labor Leader and Social Activist



- 1925: founded the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, the first successful African-American-led union
- 1963: was a principal organizer of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom
- 1964: Presented with the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Lyndon Johnson

Catholic Education

Almost since its inception in 1990, the Colorado Springs Council for Black Catholics (CSCBC) has had a particular interest in Catholic education.

Donations, and proceeds from fundraisers are used to assist families with the cost of expenses for their children in Catholic schools through the "Mary Aurelia De Witt Memorial Scholarship". The scholarship is independent of any similar program and requires completing an application and an essay written by the student.
